variously described as 'having cement overshoes' following a half million dollar financial misunderstanding with a casino, or locked in a witness protection program, or, as they say, whatever. A recent email indicated he has now a rep company in the Atlanta area. He says his WWII Marine Regiment of South Pacific veterans is having a reunion in Bransome, MO in October. Gene wrote to discover how many are left from the 3rd Battalion, full strength 5000, now 39 survivors, the only other from his platoon died early this year. He got a plaque from the

WWII Memorial Association in Washington, DC. His name and pix are enrolled at that shrine. He says he thinks of **Phil Sheridan** very often, as Phil did him a lot of favors. Say what you want...he's a candidate for something.

Its been a tough month for some notable Pioneer's. **Long John Wade**, famous for his antics on WFIL and WIBG in the 60's, has died. He was 66. All of us who worked with Long John could sit an eve-

ning over dinner with stories of this bright, engaging, fellow. We'd never run out. He was like a meteor lighting up wherever he went. What a guy! His bio is on the www.broadcastpioneers.com website. But if you want insight into LJ, ask someone who worked with him for his favorite Long John anecdote.

Another great pioneer from the 50's, 60's and 70's has died. Mary Ritts who was with WCAU-TV passed way a month before her 96th birthday. Multi-talented Mary was an artist, musician, and familiar television performer for many years. She was a fashion illustrator for Bonwit Teller,

John Wanamaker and Stetson Hats. Her work appeared in Vogue, and Harper's Bazaar. In the early 1950's, she and her husband Paul created the Ritz Puppets for "In the Park," a weekly national television series on CBS broadcast from WCAU-TV. She appeared with Jerry Lewis in movies, Lionel Hampton and George Shearing in music, and the Tonight Show. She was a true partner in every way in his life, one felt, and knowing that we extend the condolences of his many fans, and employees, and pioneers from the golden years of television in Philadelphia.
