We note the passing of two fixtures over the years on the Philadelphia broadcasting scene. After having served as Press Secretary to Governor George Leader, **Roy Nassau** was with WFIL from 1958 to 1972. Roy could, and did, everything in broadcasting. Sports, political commentary, the Mummers Parade, basketball at the Palestra, news, radio, TV, whatever, he was also a very congenial companion at work, or on the golf course. Roy was 86 and died at the Jewish Home in Harrisburg of complications from prostate cancer.

Gordon Thomas who was a familiar voice

to generations of WIP and WIBG listeners has also died. He was with WIBG until 1963 and for over 30 years thereafter with WIP. Bill Webber, among others, says he will miss him, as he was a gentle man, and a good announcer.

At 75, **Allen Stone** feels he's living the good life. After many years as WFIL's premier morning newsman during the Phil Sheridan Show, and as commercial spokesperson, Allen went into direct marketing some years ago. He is a founder and Vice
