Harry had his first appearance on television in 1939 on WPTZ, the experimental station. In later years he appeared on more than 20 Philadelphia program series, on both radio and TV. Harry was a freelance broadcaster who served as weekend anchorman for the 11 p.m. Channel 3 news. In later years he left Philadelphia to work at WMAL-TV and became anchorman for the daily 45 minute early evening news. He was also principal on-camera reporter for the White House, Congress and other government branches.
